When he breaks another rule by entering the forbidden Woods, Barclay accidentally bonds with a Beast that might eat him and is swept into a world of Lore Keepers. It's all fine and dandy in books, but Barclay doesn't actually want to be on an adventure, especially when he has a dangerous Beast trapped under his skin. All he wants is for his Beast Mark to be removed so he can go back home, but the only way that will happen is if he comes first in the apprentice Exhibition. This was truly so adorable. As the main character, Barclay is certainly someone younger kids will relate too. He's trying to find a place to fit in and be himself, but he's been on his own for so long that he's not sure what that is supposed to look like.

Dullshire told him so many things not to do that it takes time for him to come to love those actually okay things. His growth in the Lore Keeper world was well-done and very sweet. I loved Viola too. She becomes Barclay's closest ally in the Woods and I adored her spunk and cheery attitude. The magic system is what really made this shine for me. To become a Lore Keeper, one bonds with one of the magical Beasts that dwells in the different Wilderlands. There are five classes, with each being harder to bond with, but granting stronger magic. This Beast becomes their constant

companion, and when not out in the open, they return inside their Keeper's body as a

## living tattoo. Barclay accidentally bonds with Root, a Lufthund of the fourth, Mythic Class.

While he wants nothing to do with the wolf-like creature, Barclay gains the ability to control wind and run super fast. Root himself is powerful in that his howls can summon a storm. So many of these Beasts were wonderful, with so much thought and care put into them and the world they interact with. Viola has a small dragon, and others have Beasts that can cast illusion magic, electrocute you, create mirrors to travel through, or eat sound. I am a big fan of Amanda Foody's young adult novels, but this successful voyage into middle grade tells me she is a writer I will follow to the ends of the earth. Caryn - iam. One day, as she leaves the shop for her lunchbreak, she is approached by a man, Vinay Mohan Acharya, who claims to be the CEO of one of India's biggest companies.

He tells her he is looking for someone to take on his business empire, and has decided it should be her. But in order to become the heir of his empire, Sapna must pass seven tests from the "Textbook of Life". The seven tests are seven unexpected and life threatening situations with each test revealing a different quality of a leader. Sapna passes six of the seven tests with great difficulty. Though Vinay praises her for her character, Sapna is outraged at Vinay's indifference to the threat which posed to life.

Each situation explores a facet of corruption in India. So far, Sapna learns the qualities of leadership,

integrity, courage, foresight, resourcefulness and decisiveness, with Acharya keeping tabs on her and explaining the relevance of each quality. As the story progresses, it is revealed that Acharya is facing bitter rivalry from his volatile and aggressive twin brother, AK Acharya. His company is engaging in insider trading and Acharya himself is not keeping well. Acharya hints that the seventh and final test would be the hardest of all. However, as Sapna proceeds against the final task, the seventh test horribly spirals out of control. Vinay is found murdered mysteriously and Sapna is framed for the murder. Sapna escapes from jail and she discovers, to her horror, that her past had come to haunt her. Sapna uses all her wits to escape from the escalating situation and finally all is well. In the end, AK takes over Vinay's company and feels remorseful for holding a grudge against his brother.

He speaks to Sapna and gives her a letter written by Vinay long ago. The letter reveals the truth why Vinay had chosen Sapna as his successor and tells her the final lesson he intended to impart: Wisdom. AK explains Sapna his brother's intentions, clearing her doubts. Sapna turns it down, saying that she intends to follow her heart, and AK agrees with her.

I am excited to see how Foody builds these characters and this story! Wilderlore is just what you would expect from a middle-grade: quirky characters, imaginative world, and a light-hearted plot that keeps moving. I think anyone within the target audience range will be sure to enjoy this How to Train Your Dragon meets Pokemon -esque novel featuring mythical creatures, not just dragons, and a magic community. Barclay as our main character can go against what you may feel. It made me want Viola, a side character, to be the main character instead. The villain, their motives and backstory, gets thrown in there, but I was more focused on Barclay whether he would learn to love the Lore Keeper community after what it has done to him. So when the villain is brought around again to create a climax, it all happens very fast and at the very end. It gets resolved just as quickly. But even those side characters and subplots get a nice and neat resolution at the end, leaving me wondering if every book will be its own arc or is Amanda Foody creating a larger plot in the works?

Instead, I was disappointed. The book was everything you expected from a Vikas Swarup novel, only more. So much more that it can only be termed over the top. Sapna works at an electronics store in New Delhi and is the sole breadwinner of the family.

In true Bollywood style, she has an Asthmatic mother and college going younger sister to support. Burying her own dreams of marriage and love, she forges ahead in a stoical manner, saving every penny for her family. While visiting the temple one day, she is told that her life is about to change in an instant. She is met by a billionaire industrialist who tells her that he has chosen to make her the CEO of his company, if she passes seven tests of character, he has set for her. Life in New Dehli has made her tough and shrewd and Sapna is wary of anything that offers quick returns. What follows is a series of mishaps and adventures, each of which turns out to have been part of the apprenticeship.

As in his previous novels, the narrative travels at a breakneck pace, the author keeping the reader at the edge of her seat in a story that along with being entertaining touches some of the most pressing issues facing developing countries today. In addition there are references to popular Bollywood and political personalities, which add to the fun of guessing which character is based on whom. Swarup has tried in this book to tell the story of a modern day working woman and her responses to circumstances that one would find familiar if one lived in India. But the pace is too fast and the writing too simple. Most of it seems forced, instead of an organic part of the story. Its almost as if Swarup had taken his inspiration from the lurid headlines of Indian tabloids and each chapter was an attempt to scratch the surface of an important social problem in India.

As a result, the Panchayat systems, gang rape, reality TV and illegal organ transplants are all simplified into bite sized, chapter length backdrops.
